so that no one might boast in the presence of God. He is the source of your life in Christ Jesus, who became for us wisdom from God, and righteousness and sanctification and redemption, in order that, as it is written, 'Let the one who boasts, boast in the Lord.'

First Reading Job: 28:20-27

A reading from the book of Job.

Context: Today's first reading is part of a strange passage in the book of Job that scholars call the Hymn on the inaccessibility of Wisdom. The hymn begins by musing about miners overturning mountains to find gold and precious stones, but never finding Wisdom; nor can these treasures buy wisdom. Today's passage tells us Wisdom is found only with God, who alone 'understands the way to it'.

(Christians know Wisdom personified in the Word (or Logos) of God, Jesus.)

'Where then does wisdom come from?
And where is the place of understanding?
It is hidden from the eyes of all living,
and concealed from the birds of the air.

Abaddon and Death say,

"We have heard a rumour of it with our ears."

'God understands the way to it, and he knows its place.

For he looks to the ends of the earth, and sees everything under the heavens.

When he gave to the wind its weight, and apportioned out the waters by measure;

when he made a decree for the rain, and a way for the thunderbolt;

then he saw it and declared it;

he established it, and searched it out.

Second Reading:

1 Cor. 1:21-31

A reading from Paul's first Letter to the Corinthians

Context: The Church in Corinth was founded by Paul. It seems that after he moved on to preach elsewhere, divisions arose amongst the Corinthian Christians; factions focused variously on personal connections, and special knowledge or wisdom as their emphases. Paul writes that none of these is important; only belief in 'the message about the Cross'.

For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe. For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling-block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength. Consider your own call, brothers and sisters: not many of you were wise by human standards, not many were powerful, not many were of noble birth. But God chose what is foolish in the world to shame the wise; God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong; God chose what is low and despised in the world, things that are not, to reduce to nothing things that are,
